Our next meeting will be April 10, 2012 at 7:00 PM at the Whortlekill Rod and Gun Club.



March 29 has been designated as "**Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day**" by a resolution of Congress, thanks, in no small measure, to the efforts of Senator Richard Burr, Ranking Member of the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee, and Representative Linda Sanchez in the House. However belated the recognition of the service and sacrifice of those of us who served in Southeast Asia during the years of what was then America's longest war, it is appreciated.

For far too long, citizens of all political persuasions blamed those who served for the failures of those led, those officials whose military as well as political policies failed. Returning veterans were not welcomed by a grateful nation; instead, many were ignored at best, scorned at worst. The psychological issues faced by many Vietnam vets can be traced not simply to what they experienced in Vietnam but to their experience on their return home.

Perhaps America has grown up. Today, Americans embrace those who have volunteered for military service and have placed themselves in harm's way — whether they agree or disagree with the mission in Iraq or Afghanistan. These newly minted veterans and those who continue to serve, despite deployment after deployment, are offered a variety of opportunities and events across the nation by Americans who want to say in some way, Welcome Home, and Thank You for Your Service.

Americans are belatedly embracing Vietnam veterans as well, having come to the realization that those who served fought as well as their fathers and uncles did in World War II and in Korea. As we approach 50 years since the beginning of that ill-fated venture, events are being planned nationally as well as locally to honor those who served, and to remember those who were lost to the war. "Better late than never" may be a cliché, but it is never too late to say Thank You for Your Service, and Welcome Home.

Post Procedures for Funeral Ceremonies

At Funeral Home, Chapel or Home

The uniform is [dark] or grey pants, a black or dark jacket and dark necktie, with the legionnaires cap.

The Sgt. Of Arms (or designated person) will lead the Legionnaires down the right side of the chapel or Home. When reaching the front right of the Chapel or home, the designated person will order "to the left march". When lined up across the casket, the order "halt" will be called by the designated person, and then call "right face". When all are lined up to the casket, the order of hand salute will be called. Then the order "about face will be called. Now the Legionnaires will be facing the mourners. The commander or designated person will say, "another legionnaire has been called to the high command, and has gone to the commander of us all."

"We come to honor the memory of the one whom offered their life in the service of our country. He/or she is now enrolled in the spirit army of the great commander of us all. It is because of them that our lives are free and our nation lives in freedom. May this service honor his/or her sacrifices.

If it is present, a post everlasting citation (75228) is given to the next of kin. (available through National Emblem sales) by the commander or designated person.

The Chaplin will say "uncover", and say "let us pray". He will then recite "the memorial poppy, which is the national symbol of the flower at Flanders Field in Belgium that embodies the sacrifices of men and women who served and died for their country in all our wars or conflicts." He recites a prayer "we now leave this poppy with you in your honor and an eternal reminder of the binding comradeship we feel for you."

A designated person, places the poppy on the chest of the departed legionnaire at the end of the chaplain's words.

The Sgt. Of arms (or designated person) will call "cover", and will say "farewell to our friend, our legionnaire and comrade". A hand salute is called. He then will say 'Two, right face."

The legionnaires march to the right corner of the casket when the order "to the right march" is called. Then everyone marches out.
