Oratorical Competition

The time is now! WE CAN USE EXTRA HELP ON THE ORATORICAL COMPETITION. LET ME KNOW IF YOU CAN HELP THE POST. We're due to hit the high schools in search for Oratorical candidates.

This competition is open to anyone from 14 to 20, enrolled in organized education. I say that because home schooled kids make great candidates. The National Oratorical committee, each year, searches the U.S. Constitution Bill of Rights and Civil Rights for specific clauses from 4 different Amendments. Contestants speak, initially, for 8 to 10 minutes, on the clause of their choice. They speak at the post level, where the speaker with the highest score is modestly rewarded. All contestants from the post level then proceed to the county, district and zone levels within a state. The highest scored contestants then proceed to their state capital, where one contestant is rewarded, as well as sent to Indianapolis to the National competition. There are a number of prizes, in the form of college scholarships, range from \$10,000 to \$18,000.

Veterans in the Classroom

At John Jay, every Tuesday, Kevin lectures at two study halls about the American Legion. You wouldn't believe how many people—children AND adults---ask him, "What IS the American Legion?" Kevin usually spend 15 to 20 minutes talking to the kids (all high school ages) about the Legion: when it began, by whom, where, and why. We discuss WW1 thru Vietnam, and how the vets have returned from wars and how they still do. We discuss the four pillars, and from class to class, we talk about different parts of each. More than that, we talk about why these programs are necessary.

Kevin always finishes a talk to applause. He has the attention of most of the kids, and finishes up by telling them to talk to the vets in their family. That it's good to talk, and it's good to listen, to learn.

Funny thing, after doing it last year, Bonnie King, the principal, asked him to come in to plan another year.

Kevin has resumed a dialog with Darlene Seckler, Principal's secretary at Roy C. Ketcham High School, to lecture study halls on Thursdays. Stay tuned.

Anyone can do this. We can use some help. You'd like it, and you can tell the kids your experiences. You have them under your spell. And it warms your heart.

A message from Post 1758 member Mark Baaden now deployed to Somalia.......Jim Reynolds

All,

I'm enjoying the great weather here in Mogadishu today. Too bad it's a work day for us and a holy day for the locals except "Kissy" for Kismayo because that's where we got her. She has feasted on roasted lamb courtesy of our team all day. In turn, after her food coma nap, we need her to bark loudly tonight as a warning while we relax with some duty free purchases courtesy of our Brit friends. It is Remembrance Day for them and we were invited to share in a beautiful ceremony at 1100 today with them since it is more like a somber Memorial Day in their tradition. Bagpipes, prayers, bugles and they sang "God save

the Queen" while we respectfully stood at attention. We were the only foreign forces assigned here invited to their ceremony. It was a real honor and great show of friendship and respect. However, it's also Friday and that means the locals that heard westerners playing bugles and bagpipes to honor their fallen on their holy day of the week are likely pissed so it could get interesting which is why we "showed the colors" as the photos depict in order to remind them that they can try to bring it but it will cost them. It's a great way to spend Vet's day frankly for me. It's what it's all about. Be not afraid of those that hate freedom. That's an Army/Navy team in the photo holding our colors. I tease Dave all of the time because they actually fit that giant man in a submarine for months at a time when he started his Navy career for months at a time. I think I had easier jumping from planes.

Jim was invited by Dutchess County RSVP to attend the 2016 Veteran's Day program at Castle Point this afternoon. The guest speaker was former Korean War POW Raymond B Mellin. This guy is as humble and low key as they get. Not the usual "professional" speaker that we get at many events. He worked without notes and apologized several times for his "lack of finesse" as speaking in front of a group was a new experience for him.

He was sent to Japan in mid-June 1950 as a lab technician. Ten days later the Korean War broke out and he was immediately transferred to Korea and made a medic with no training. On July 5th, just a couple of days later he was captured and spent 38 months as a prisoner of war. He spoke about the POW's treatment, lack of food and forced marches where some were shot for stepping out of formation to relieve themselves. At one time there were several hundred prisoners being marched together and they were broken into groups of 50 with an American officer in charge of each group. The officers would be punished if men fell out of the marching formation. One was shot in the head because he had more men collapse than the others. When they finally got to a POW camp after a 120 mile march there was not room for all of them inside the buildings so they took turns sleeping outside. It was not unusual to have 15-20 freeze to death overnight. Ray got emotional several times as he spoke about the men who were lost either shot, frozen or died of malnutrition. Many in the audience had tears as he told the story. I had a chance to speak to him for a couple of minutes and encouraged him to put his experience down on paper for historical purposes. He said he had started to do that. Hopefully someday you'll all be able to read his story. This is a link with basic information about his ordeal.
