Students gathered around the flagpole at Roy C. Ketcham High School (RCK) for a Veterans Day Ceremony on

RCK's Chamber Choir honored the veterans by singing the National Anthem and "America the Beautiful." A student played a beautiful rendition of "Taps" as the flag was raised by

members of American Legion Post 1758 in Hopewell Junction.

Speaker Jim Reynolds served from 1965-1968 in the U.S. Army. "We've lost some of the information on veterans over the years," he said, emphasizing the need to stay in local schools and stress the importance of honoring veterans to students. Reynolds said there are currently 20 million veterans living in

the United States.

Post 1758 attends the Veterans Day ceremony yearly at RCK, as well as returning annually for the Memorial Day ceremony.

Other veterans present included Kevin Hathorn and Jimmy Metrando. Hathorn served in the U.S. Navy from 1968-1972, and Metrando served in the Marine Corps from 1963-1969. Metrando recounted a breakfast for veterans at Gayhead Elementary School last week where he was encouraged by the respectful and articulate questions that seven-year-olds asked the veterans.


"Make your parents proud and God bless the United States of America," Reynolds concluded.

William Harvey Carney was the first African-American awarded the Medal of Honor. He was born a slave in Virginia, but eventually made his way to freedom in Massachusetts.

When the Union Army began accepting volunteers, he joined the 54th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment, the first African-American unit in organized by the northern states, though it was led by white officers.

The 54th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment, led by Robert Gould Shaw, was tasked with <u>taking Fort Wagner</u>, a beachhead fortification that guarded the southern approach to Charleston Harbor.


A previous attack on the fort failed, and the 54th was chosen for the next attempt. As the soldiers stormed the fort's walls, the Union flag bearer was killed. Carney grabbed the flag and held it for the duration of the battle.

Carney, along with the rest of the 54th, was forced to retreat. Throughout the battle Carney never lost possession of the flag, despite suffering multiple injuries. "Boys, I only did my duty; the old flag never touched the ground!" he said after the battle.

Carney was awarded the Medal of Honor in 1900.
